
## **E-SAFETY WEEK**

On Monday, 5th February, we launched our 'E-Safety' week across school (staying safe online).

- We used the book, 'Chicken Clicking' to teach the children about 'stranger danger' online
- Our PCSOs Will and Rich led an assembly on how to stay safe when using the Internet e.g. not sharing passwords and which apps they should/ should not be using
- Miss Gilsenan led a parent workshop to promote e-safety—thank you parent and carers that attended, your feedback was amazing!
- Miss Gilsenan and Mrs Sohanpal took a group of children from Key Stage 1 to The Quad to take part in a computing and e-safety morning
- The children were taught what to do if they saw something scary or came across something that they didn't like when using the Internet: **STOP, CLOSE, REPORT**
- Every child was asked to name five adults that they could talk to if they were worried/scared about something that they had seen on the Internet

# What are the risks of online games?

- Children may view inappropriate or upsetting content if they play games that aren't suitable for their age. This could include sexual or violent material. It might be in-game content or produced by other players.
- Some players can be abusive towards others or try to exlude them from the game. Some players may also hack another user's account or try to steal and destroy their virtual possessions. This can be as upsetting for a young person as if it happened in real life.
- Children may play with adults they don't know. People of all ages play games. Some adults may exploit this and try to build an emotional connection with a child for the purpose of <u>grooming</u>.
- Some children may find it hard to stop playing games or find that gaming is getting the way of them doing other activities.

#### SCHOOL DINNERS UPDATES

Last term I reported that we were looking carefully at the range of food options that are offered to our children during lunchtime. Our parent questionnaires especially queried the variety of vegetarian options that are available and this is an issue that we want to tackle positively. At present, our school dinners are managed by an outside catering company but served on-site by our wonderful kitchen staff. Over the past four weeks, we have been speaking with parents, children and our lunchtime staff and asking for views and opinions on the quality and range of meal options available. Last week, a meeting was held with myself, Mrs Sohanpal and the Head Chef from the catering company. Following ideas suggested by staff, parents and children, new meal options are currently being trialled. Our new school council are currently running Pupil Surveys and we are encouraging children to leave suggestions/ideas to help us to improve our menu. A further meeting has been arranged to allow all feedback to be shared. It is very important that we listen to our children and parents—we want our mealtimes to be healthy and enjoyable for everybody! Thank
