

# Where will your child 'Get Caught Reading'?

#### GATE SAFETY—SAFEGUARDING

At St Chad's, the safety and security of our children is our number one priority. Over recent weeks, parents have been observed propping open our main school gate and opening the gate to the Foundation Stage playground. <u>Gates can only</u> <u>be opened and closed by staff</u>. Please never prop open or pin back the main school gate.





Please can I kindly remind all parents that the code to our keypad <u>is strictly</u> <u>confidential. No parents should be observing staff entering the code. Only staff</u> <u>have authorisation to use our keypad.</u>

# **READING REMINDERS**

We are noticing a significant improvement in book bags in school. Please ensure that your child brings their book bag with them every day. We also noticed an

improvement in reading records being completed. All children should be reading three times a week at home with an adult. Please remember to sign your child's reading record to say that they have read.



#### **CLASS DOJO**

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You may have heard your child recently talking about receiving a 'Dojo'.....

Over the past term, we have been reviewing our behaviour policy. At St Chad's, we take a very positive approach to managing behaviour. Our school ethos, *LOVE,* underpins how we want everybody to behave in school. We:

- Look after our school and each other
- Only ever do our best
- Value everyone and remember our manners
- Enjoy our learning!




As a Church School, we use our Collective Worship to help to teach our children what these values mean and more importantly what they look like. For example, a child holding open a door is showing excellent manners; a child helping to sweep up after an art lesson is helping to look after our school; a child showing good listening and sitting is trying their best....

We have introduced Class Dojo (an online resource) to reward children for displaying LOVE in our school. Every child has their own 'Dojo' that they can see and access in all lessons. They choose the colour of their Dojo and can even give it a name! Feedback from children and staff has been excellent. We have linked our Dojo rewards to:

- home-school links e.g. remembering to bring book bag, reading three times a week at home, completing Home Learn activities
- general behaviour e.g. good sitting, good listening, sensible walking in school
- higher-level 'learning behaviour' e.g. asking a good question, using a new word
- values linked explicitly to our school's Christian ethos of LOVE e.g. showing kind hands, making good choices

At the moment, the School Council are reviewing how many Dojos a child needs to achieve to be rewarded with their Bronze, Silver and Gold award. We have a special 'surprise treat' for the first child to achieve 100 Dojos in school! As well as Class Dojo, we continue to run our weekly Golden Book disco and half-termly Kings and Queens.





# SCHOOL COUNCIL

As shared in our last newsletter, we have a new School Council up and running in school (our LOVE Council). Although we are an infant school, I want to teach our children the importance of democracy and show them that their voices matter. On Friday, 16th March, our 6 school counsellors had the opportunity to visit the Council House in town. The children successfully led their very own School Council meeting in the Council House Chambers. They are the youngest children to have ever sat in this part of the building! I was so immensely proud of them. They created an agenda, listened to each other's views and ideas and asked excellent questions. They have been instrumental in helping to get Class Dojo up and running in school. At the moment, they are supporting me in improving rewards given out for Golden Book and Bronze, Silver and Gold awards. They are responsible for generating pupil surveys and gathering the views and ideas of the whole school. I am so IMMMESNELY proud of them. I would like to say a huge thank you to Pat Geary (our governor) for joining me on the outing. The children enjoyed touring the building and were even photographed by the Derby Telegraph. They definitely deserved their treat from Greggs for all of their hard work!











#### **OUR WORLD WEEK**

We finished our last day of term on Friday, 16th February, with an International Food Fair. We were blown away by your kindness and generosity (and amazing cooking skills!). Children (and staff) enjoyed learning about different foods from around the world—I couldn't stop eating the delicious dishes on offer! Children spoke with such warmth and enthusiasm about 'family favourites' from home. As this event was so successful, we would like to do something similar in the summer term. On Friday, 9th March, Groovy Giraffes took part in a Celebration of Dance festival at the Riverside Centre (Pride Park). The event was organised through Derby School Sports Partnership (SSP). Over the past 6 weeks, children in the Giraffes have bee receiving dance lessons through a trained dance teacher as part of their PE lessons and have learned a fully choreographed routine. This year, the theme for the dance festival was 'Beach Party'. Children had the opportunity to perform on stage to a very large audience. #### YEAR 2 EASTER EXPERIENCE—St Augustine's Church

On Wednesday, 14th March, Year 2 children were invited to St Augustine's church to take part in an 'Easter Experience'. To start, a volunteer read the Easter Story and the children then acted it out with some props. In groups, they explored each part of the Easter Story e.g. the crucifixion, the Garden of Gethsemane and Last Supper. There was a lot of discussion about feelings,

which linked well with Salvation. They finished at the tomb and celebrated Jesus being alive. Reverend Andy led a group (Garden of Gethsemane) and Reverend Sarah popped in to say hello!
